Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day By Linda Sibley

Did you know that December 7 is Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day? It is not listed on the calendars, and it is not a federal holiday, so government offices, schools, and other businesses do not close. So, what is important about Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day?

On August 23, 1994, the United States Congress, by Public Law 103-308, designated December 7 of each year as National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day. It is a day to remember and honor all those who died in the attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. It is a tradition to fly the flag of the United States at half-staff until sunset in honor of dead patriots.

This story comes from a dear friend, Mrs. LaRue Miller. Mrs. Miller is a retired Midlothian teacher, much loved by the community. The story about the actions of her brother-in-law, Doris Miller on that fateful day, December 7, 1941 at Pearl Harbor.

Doris was born October 12, 1919 in Waco, Texas to Henrietta and Connery Miller. His mother wanted a girl and was determined to call her third child, Doris. So, she named him Doris. While in service friends started calling him Dorie.

On September 16, 1939 he enlisted in the U.S. Navy. He became a Mess Attendant Third Class and in 1940 was promoted to Ship's Cook Third Class on the battleship West Virginia.

On December 7, 1941, he was collecting laundry when the alarm for general quarters sounded. He headed for his battle station, the anti-aircraft battery, magazine at midship, only to discover that torpedo damage had wrecked it, so he went on deck. Dorie was six feet 3 inches and weighed more than two hundred pounds. In fact, he was the ship's heavyweight boxing champion. Because of this physical prowess, he was assigned to carry wounded fellow sailors to places of greater safety. The Lieutenant Commander Johnson ordered him to accompany him to the bridge to assist with moving the ship's Captain who was mortally wounded.

While there he was ordered to help load the unmanned Browning .50 caliber anti-aircraft machine guns. He really was not expected to man one of the guns but that is what he did until he ran out of ammo.

During the attack, Japanese aircraft dropped two armored piercing bombs through the deck of the battleship and

launched five 18-inch aircraft torpedoes into her port side. Heavily damage by the ensuring explosions, and suffering from severe flooding below decks, the crew abandoned ship while the West Virginia slowly settled to the harbor bottom. Of the 1,541 men on West Virginia during the attack, 130 were killed and 53 wounded.

Doris (Dorie) Miller was the first African American to be awarded the Navy Cross. He was also awarded the Purple Heart, a Good Conduct Medal, an American Defense Medal with Fleet Clasp, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Service Medal, and World War II Victory Medal.

He was killed on November 24, 1943 in the line of duty while serving in action on the USS Liscome Bay (CVE-56) during Operation Galvanic, the seizure of Makin and Tarawa Atolls in the Gilbert Islands. While cruising near Brutalitarian Island, a single tornado form Japanese submarine 1-175 struck the escort carrier near the stern. The aircraft bomb magazine detonated a few moments later, sinking the warship within minutes.

His body was never found but a memorial service was held on April 30, 1944 in Waco, Texas. Mrs. Miller told me that the parents of Doris, her husband, Arthur, and many others from the family are buried at the Doris Miller Cemetery, names in honor of him.

He was a true hero. We must never forget that Doris (Dorie) Miller and others at Pearl Harbor gave of themselves to protect and defend America. Remember this December 7.....remember Doris Miller and his brave deeds.
